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decision was to still pay for the last trimester. As mentioned yesterday, that money is still matched by federal dollars. This amendment would be the equivalent of an A bill on LB 20. Since we're not on the A bills, we're doing the action now and basically what we're doing is we're striking a million two savings for the fiscal year we're now in and inserting 854, and so, I mean, there's still the...that's the difference. We're putting the...striking the million two, putting in 854. The difference between there is what we actually are going to save this year. So, with that...well, no, excuse me, we're actually going to save 854,000, but this is the equivalent of the A bill for LB 20.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Moore. Discussion on the Moore amendment. Senator Schmit, did you wish to discuss it? Anyone wishing to discuss the Moore amendment? Seeing no one, do you wish to close, Senator Moore?

SENATOR MOORE: Just to clarify my muddled introduction. With this amendment, instead of saving \$1.2 million, the state will be saving 854,000. With that, I would ask for adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Moore. You've heard the closing on the amendment by Senator Moore. We'll now vote on the amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of Senator Moore's amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: The Moore amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Wesely would move to amend the bill. (The Wesely amendment appears on page 133 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and members, this amendment would delete, I believe, \$1.5 million from the budget designated to be funding for Curtis College. It is of concern. Last night we had a discussion about this to some degree and I have tried to, in the short hours since then, come to some understanding of what the status is of Curtis campus in the
