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step and that being tightening that down to the point where we're talking about only those people who truly have taken that particular incentive and are actively engaged in it as Senator Landis discussed.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Conway. Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, Mr. President and members of the body. I would like to comment on the Landis amendment. Senator Landis, I think that would be a worthwhile amendment to pursue. I would like to have a little time, Mr. President, to maybe get an amendment drafted and then we could come back to this, maybe lay it over on the agenda, come back to it. But before I make that request of you, I'd just like to reiterate that I think a commitment to a guard enrollee is a little bit different than a commitment to, say, a welfare recipient, or to a city government, or to anyone else that we make appropriations to, because you're asking the guardsperson to give up something. You're asking them for six years commitment to your state and to the guard. So I think our commitment is a little bit different to these people who are enrolled in the guard. I'd also like to expand on what Senator Bohlke mentioned. Yes, the savings, and these, I want you to know, are not firm figures, they are very rough figures, they are "guesstimates", if you will. The first year savings would be 73,200, but then the next year's savings would be 156,000; and then the next year saving would be 249,000, almost 250,000, and it just goes up over the next few years. So I want you to know that, to know that it isn't just the 73,000 or whatever comes close to that. I must emphasize it's a "guesstimate" only. With that, I would like the body's indulgence, maybe, to have a time-out so we can get an amendment drafted and come back to that, is that acceptable, Mr. President, a time-out?

SPEAKER BAACK: Well, Senator Schimek, I will have to consult with Senator Moore. This is the Appropriations Committee bill, so I'm going to ask Senator Moore if he minds if we pass over, for a few minutes, while Senator Schimek...

SENATOR MOORE: How many bills have we got to deal with today?

SPEAKER BAACK: We've got three other ones to deal with after this one.
