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so that we have the ability, I believe, to tax, classify, and exempt, and that is what we should be doing, not a general sales and income tax that frankly the voters and the taxpayers of this state will not tolerate. And I think it would be ridiculous for us to think that on the backs of those people we should go about correcting this problem, and then be coming back a month from now knowing full well that we are facing probably a \$150 million shortfall,...

PRESIDENT MOUL: Time.

SENATOR HALL: ...having taken that option off the table and that is exactly what the passage of LB 5 would do. Thank you, Madam President.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Hall. Mr. Clerk, do you have an amendment on the desk?

CLERK: Madam President, Senator Haberman would move to indefinitely postpone LB 5. Senator Hefner would have the opportunity to lay the bill over.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Hefner.

SENATOR HEFNER: I will lay the bill over.

PRESIDENT MOUL: The bill has been laid over. I will recognize the Speaker.

SPEAKER BAACK: Yes, Madam President and colleagues, we will now take up LB 1. It is back on the agenda and we will take up LB 1 to try to stay within the time frame that we have for this session, so we will now take up LB 1.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

CLERK: Madam President, LB 1 was discussed this morning. The bill failed to advance as I am sure the members know. I now have pending to the bill an amendment by Senator Schrock. (See AM45S4 on page 31 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Schrock.
