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it's no longer right because the big shot said it is not right. I'm not going to change the vote that I cast. It was right at that time, I feel that it's right now. It's unfortunate that the ordinary people, who make up the bulk of this state, cannot get the consideration over an entire session, that a big shot outfit can get just by sending one person in here and saying, hey, that impinges on my domain, change it, and it's changed, and it's changed. I had a proposal up there which, Mr. Clerk, when I sit down I want to withdraw it. I was offering the creation of a thumb tax, because I have a thumb, you have a thumb, all of God's children have a thumb. It's something which we all could contribute. But now, having been alienated, yes, Senator Hefner, everybody's got two thumbs, and you'd only lose one if you didn't pay the tax. But at any rate, I want to withdraw that. It was going to be offered as a little diversion. But I see that we're being very serious here today, and nothing has really changed. The election is over, some people feel euphoria because there has been a change at the national level, other people feel deep depression for the same reason. But at the state level, in the Legislature nothing has changed. The big shots own this Legislature and we all know it. During the last special session, when we were helping to operate Governor Ben Nelson's butcher shop, you know, cut, cut, cut, we were talking about trying to help pregnant women, and that was too difficult a thing for us to because the problems of an economic nature are too grave. One big shot comes in here and the whole Legislature or a majority of the Legislature will cut and run. I think it is shameful and we ought not do it. Senator Hall said the timing is not right. When I was a small child, Senator Pirsch, many, many years ago, I went to Sunday school, and one of the things I was taught is that the time is always right to do right. Only in a political, opportunistic world can you say that the timing is not right to do right. That which is right...

PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...was done, now an attempt is being made to undo it. I hope enough will vote no so that this reconsideration is not successful. If it is successful, then all of those other interests from the rural areas, those people who are trying to get that depreciation amendment that Senator Hartnett offered, ought to be given consideration and granted what it is that they want, too.
