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that and you will soon get one. What this is is that Senator Baack's amendment, Section 11 of Senator Baack's amendment would make a straight repeal of the sales tax on farm machinery instead of the convoluted refund mechanism that is now in place. Senator Baack's amendment, by itself, all it does is just simply make that a straight exemption on the front end. You may remember an amendment that I filed that was basically the same amendment we had in the July...was it July or August special session we had earlier this year, dealing with some sort of reporting mechanism. And what my amendment does is basically grants power to the revenue commissioner, the tax commissioner to require some sort of form. And the thought is that now, obviously, you send that information. One of the main reasons that the paper trail was created and that you had to file for the refund was so that there would be some sort of mechanism of keeping track of what was bought and what it was worth. I think, with my amendment to Senator Baack's amendment, you can have the exemption on the front end and still have as good a paper trail and only have the same information filed with the tax commissioner, with the tax commissioner, and then give to the county assessor. So I think you achieve the same goal that was originally intended by making the individual file for refund, but I think it does it in a much cleaner method. I think, ideally, what has been talked about at least is simply of a triplicate form. When I go into my farm implement dealer I sign the form that says this is going to be used for agriculture purposes and, therefore, I qualify for the exemption, that...the amount of the purchase and your signed affidavit that it's going to be used for agriculture purposes would then go to the Department of Revenue and it would be the same information they were getting if you had to file for the refund. But it's simply, I think, with this amendment, along with Senator Baack's amendment, makes a whole lot more sense out there and puts at least some common sense into that small fraction of 1063. So that's what my amendment does. I would ask for adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Moore. I will now recognize senators wishing to address the Moore amendment to the amendment. Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: No, I will wait for the amendment.
