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and, basically, as I said, there is some question whether or not we actually need it, but allows the tax commissioner to develop a form for the reporting of this, and with that in concert with Section 11 and Senator Baack's amendment we give the straight up front exemption. Now Section 12 would allow the tax commissioner to develop a reporting period as far as the effective date, I guess we're working on that, but this part of the amendment would simply make sure that the tax commissioner has the ability to create a form to get the information and in turn give that information to the county assessor. And so, with that, I would ask for adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Moore. We will now vote on the Moore amendment to the Baack amendment. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on adoption of Senator Moore's amendment to Senator Baack's amendment.

PRESIDENT MOUL: The amendment to the amendment is adopted. We will now proceed with debate on the Baack amendment. Senator Haberman, followed by Senators Schmit, Lamb and Wesely.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Madam President and members of the body, as I read Senator Baack's amendment, it says, commencing April 1 of 1992 through December 31, 1992 there shall be imposed a fee of \$3 per ton. That's for seven months we're going to pay \$3 a ton. We get a dollar off for seven months. Then starting January 1, 1993 it goes back to \$4. So you take the dictionary and you look up under compromise, a settlement of differences in which each side makes concessions. I would like to have someone explain to me what concession the other side made, what concession this other side, and the other side I mean the people who said, we're going to not pay any tax for seven months. Thank you. I should kiss your feet, if I knew who you were, for being so generous to us. We don't have to pay but \$3 a ton. You're giving us a dollar off. Oh, my Lord, mercy, you're all heart. For seven months you're giving us a dollar off. That's a compromise, folks. Look in the dictionary, come back here and read it, it's where both sides give something. What did the other side give? Senator Withem is sitting here, he doesn't know what the other side gave. Senator Wehrbein, do you know what the other side gave? He smiles, he doesn't know what the other side gave. So what is a compromise? It's where both
