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try to speak out for the interests of agriculture, but when you have the Nebraska Farm Bureau, which has an insurance plan that draws more urban people and, therefore, their interests coincide with those in the urban areas and not those of the farmers, and you are going to have the World-Herald and others taking the Farm Bureau as the voice of the farmers, the farmers will never get anything. The rural people, not everybody in the rural community is a farmer, but their interests are the same. When the little towns die, the farmer hurts. When the farmer goes out of business, the little town is hurt. So rural/ag can go together with a slash between the two. Agriculture has steadily had its interests nibbled away by this Legislature because senators will always say, from that area, I want to do what is in the best interest of the state. No, what they are persuaded to see as the best interest of the state is the interest which is contrary to theirs. They have been conned into rolling over on every one of these questions and saying, despite how I feel, despite the negative impact on my constituents, I am going to do what's best for this state; no, what's best for a part of the state. And if there is a quid pro quo, if there is understanding, if there are concessions that we grant to each other in the interest of being statespersons, then why do all of the benefits flow in one direction? When they flow in one direction, benefit the same interests, that is not by coincidence or happenstance, that is planned, deliberate, intentional, and it is carried out to perfection. Nobody could listen to what happens on this legislative floor and get the idea that Nebraska is supposed to be an agricultural state. The interests have gone down the drain, so you all can now go back to your constituents and say, we got you one dollar. They say, one dollar! They originally took four from me, if that is what the issue is. You got me one dollar. So the highwayman catches me traveling between Omaha and Lincoln and takes my billfold, takes...

PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...all of my money, \$100 from me, and you get \$25 from him back, and I am supposed to praise you and say the highwayman is thereby rendered an honest person. You think because when the gun was put to my head and I gave the money under those coercing conditions that I voluntarily relinquished it. No, it was taken from me and your job was to protect me and you did not. And now you sell me out for one dollar. This is a bad bill, not just because of what it says, Senator Moore, but
