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and environmental purposes that we committed to last session, because there are going to be a lot of people after that money like skinny dogs on a bone and we need to protect it for those purposes. So we're looking for one or more good people to fill that bill. So keep the long-term vision on the environment, I think it's very important. And I think we've done some very good work. We've started to move in the right direction. And, for "Cap", I hope someone will answer the ad to help him because that's a very important issue. We've been beaten up a lot but we've done some really good things and brought more accountability to that process. And to Mr. Breslow I would like to say quickly, without private phone lines, protected records, I couldn't have done many of the things I did in solid waste and low-level. Had a lot of people calling me, telling me things that wouldn't have been done if the people with the money and the time to sit up here and review my record were allowed to do it. So don't think...I don't think you, Mr. Breslow, would want your audit...auditor's hot-line made public and don't think you're the only one or that you should be the only one that get those kind of calls. Many people put in a lot of free time and effort, a lot of investigative work in the radioactive waste and the solid waste area that honestly, John, honestly wouldn't have been able to call me and expose some of the things we exposed in that process if it had been public knowledge. And in low-level, who wants to drive that unit? We need a person that is really ready to stand in there and wade into that issue and help "Cap" out. Want you all to remember that the Boyd County people are just like your friends and neighbors, just like your friends and neighbors, and five years ago they were happy, one group, one community. And now this process has ripped them apart but they're just good people that are scared. We still have a lot of things to do on that issue, shared liability, shared state liability. We need to address that. We need to prevent the state from prematurely taking title to the land and the waste, very important, very important. Put the liability on the ones it belongs to, the multibillion dollar corporations that made profits from producing that waste. Very important. I have a piece of legislation in the office that will do that if anyone wants to come down and pick it up. Unfortunately, haven't been able to do that in my four years but I think it is a priority for everyone here. But who wants that job? I hope someone here wants it because it can eat you alive, but it's very important. We need to look long term. I don't know if we need to pour more money down what I see as a rathole.. We need to admit our mistakes and move on. There are answers there and there are
