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I would say, however, Senator Kristensen, that if, for example, a laptop computer makes the type of sound for a period of time that certain senators are irritated by that sound, that I think they would be able to go to the Legislative Council and ask for a ruling on that. I think it does not preclude that possibility.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Of course, that could be true with senators emitting those annoying sounds as well.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: That is correct, absolutely correct.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Thank you. I support the amendment.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Kristensen. Senator Pedersen

SENATOR PEDERSEN: Madam President, members of the Legislature, Senator Bernard-Stevens, would you respond again, please.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Bernard-Stevens.

SENATOR PEDERSEN: I wear a beeper, and I've carried a beeper for many, many years. You are definitely saying this has only to do with audible sound, is that right?

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: That is correct. There are beepers, for example, that have a different feel to them, that you would be able to use that do not make a sound. I do not know if you have one of those or not.

SENATOR PEDERSEN: Yes. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Pedersen. Any further discussion? Senator Bohlke.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Madam President, members, Senator Bernard-Stevens, if you'll answer a question. I haven't had a chance to look at this. I know we discussed this, and I support you on this. But I was in the East Chamber during the swearing in of Supreme Court Justice Connolly. We had a phone going off a number of times. Would this cover the East Chamber as well?

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Only in the regards of if there was a legislative session in that, if there's a legislative hearing.
