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the body. I haven't gotten up to speak on any of these rules issues to date because, after having spent six years in the body, I've begun to realize that we probably should just leave the rules alone and come in some year and not attempt to do anything with them, because no matter what we do, we have to come in the next year with yet another change and, you know, it may be an exercise in futility. We may be taking time from important issues that deserve debate, not that I don't think the rules are important, I think they are very important. But I am getting a little bit cynical about whether they can really be improved or not. But having said all of that, I decided to get up because I do have concern about this rule change, and number 15, for some of the same reasons that Senator Chambers already discussed, also Senator Hall. I guess I think...I am not sure the language does really what you would like to do, Senator Bromm, and I have to ask one more question if you are still...yes, you are, thank you. You know, what is successive? Must it be made...I mean we've talked about whether there can be intervening issues or not but my question goes in a little bit different direction, is it successive if it is made by different people, or must it be made by the same person in order to be considered dilatory?

SENATOR BROMM: Senator,...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Bromm, if you'd answer that.

SENATOR BROMM: ...the rule proposal doesn't say that the motions would have to be by the same person, so it would be my understanding that successive motions made by two or three different individuals could be ruled out of order just as well as by one individual. Perhaps there would...you know, there could be two or three of us that decide that we are going to pursue this tactic and that's no different than if just one of us does, really.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, I appreciate that, and I understand how people can be working together on the same issue and may wish to do something like that in order to maybe get to maybe keep something from moving forward, but I guess my concern is I see many times on this floor, when it is approaching the noon hour, when there have been motions to adjourn, and, somehow, and I have made those motions myself and haven't been successful, and the feeling kind of ripples through the body that, no, we are going to stay and we are going to talk about this issue, and we
