PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR BROMM: ...shouldn't have the option of doing that to the body, and that's what the Rules Committee is trying to avoid. So I encourage you to simply don't be swept up by technicalities, but to adopt the rule as a good faith effort to try to allow this body to function in a reasonable manner. It is not a major rule change, and so whatever you decide to do is fine, but I'd urge you to adopt it.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Bromm. The question before you is the proposed rule change, number 14. All those in favor vote aye; all those opposed vote nay. Have you all voted? There has been a request for a call of the house. All those in favor vote aye; all those opposed vote nay. Please record.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 0 nays to go under call, Madam President.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The house is under call. Will all senators please return to their seats, will all unauthorized personnel please leave the floor. The house is under call. Senator Avery, Senator Lynch, Senator Matzke, Senator Robak, Senator Schellpeper, Senator Day, will you check in please. Senator Warner, Senator Withem. Senator Robak and Senator Lynch. The house is under call, will all senators please remain in your seats. Senator. There has been a request for a roll call vote, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken. See page 305 of the Legislative Journal.) 29 yes, 15 nays on the amendment.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The amendment is adopted. I raise the call.
