SPEAKER WITHEM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Hall, on the Chambers amendment.

SENATOR HALL: Mr. President, members, Senator Chambers, would you respond to a question?

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I will.

SENATOR HALL: Senator Chambers, as I understand the motion, at least as I think I understand what you're trying to do, do you strike the original proposal altogether?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, this should be added.

SENATOR HALL: Okay, now where would it be added? Just to the bottom?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Probably so because we have the second version presented to us now and I don't think it conflicts with anything in that version. And by adding it at the bottom the last sentence in my amendment, no appeal may be taken to overrule this provision, would apply to the language that I'm offering. And as I told Senator Beutler, if it's not clear that it will apply only to that, I will rewrite that sentence. But in the material I'm not changing. It already allows for the appeal of the Speaker's ruling on something being dilatory.

SENATOR HALL: Right, but the way your amendment is drafted would it allow an individual to appeal the original decision by the Chair?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, that is already provided for and I don't strike that.

SENATOR HALL: Okay, but that would be allowed with the adoption of your amendment. The only...the only...the only...the second...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I can rewrite the sentence.
