because they dealt with a discreet section of the bill which could be validly amended, but we didn't have to go through them all. But when something like this that is being proposed is adopted, to protect yourself and avoid the prospect of having your amendments ruled dilatory and you're not being recognized to offer any more of them you've got to offer every possible amendment that you or anybody else might offer so that once yours are ruled to be dilatory, nobody else can offer them at that stage of debate and the bill has to move forward without any amending. But the fact that they are ruled dilatory does not mean they are dropped. They can still be offered at the next stage so my amendments still are the first ones up and if they are ruled dilatory at Select File then nobody else can offer them either and the bill has to move to Final Reading and then I just convert them to motions to return for a specific amendment. And they are considered dilatory because the lobby or somebody doesn't like them and here is a bill that has to be advanced and passed without any amending because in the attempt, heavy-handed, that is being made here today to stop, I'm going to be more generous, some members of the Legislature, you stop everything and sometimes the only way to demonstrate that a rule is a bad rule...

SENATOR HALL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...is to show the harm that it can cause and I'm stating to you in advance the harm that it can cause and I will be willing to demonstrate it. And some people say Ernie makes threats. Those are not threats. You ought to be glad that I come to you openly and aboveboard and tell you in advance what I'll do instead a lot of your colleagues who will make you think they mean one thing, then the next thing you know you've got something sunk deeply into your back. I'm not going to sneak up on you. I'm just telling you and I will do it just to show that it's a bad rule. Senator Schimek's advice should be heeded but I know it won't. This is not a good rule and I'm opposed to it and I hope that enough of the members will see the problems with it, even some that I have not mentioned...

SENATOR HALL: Time.
