So I understand the rationale that Senator Chambers has of thinking these honors should come only after a person has departed. But it's not necessarily traditional in Nebraska to do that.

SENATOR WESELY: Well, I think it's worth raising the question, because having gone through the experience with Senator Fitzgerald, I think probably it is in the best interest that for the most part, when we want to honor somebody by naming a building after them, that it be after they pass on to the better world. But at the same time, obviously the precedent has been there with higher education. So I think that in this particular case I don't have a problem. But I would hope that somebody would look into this further, because I think there is a legitimate question to be raised here. Although I think the precedent is fine in this particular case, I think looking at this further would be in our best interest.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Seeing no further lights, the motion...or, Senator Engel, do you wish to close? Closing has been waived. Motion before you is the adoption of LR 32. All those...and LR 8, I understand. Senator Chambers, for what purpose to you rise?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I would ask to divide that question and take them individually.

SENATOR BEUTLER: The motion is divided and we will take up LR 9 first. So the motion before you is the adoption of LR 8. All those in favor say (sic) aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 36 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of LR 8.

SENATOR BEUTLER: The resolution is adopted. Now we'll move to the vote on LR 32. The motion before you is the adoption of LR 32. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 35 ayes, 1 nay, Mr. President, on adoption of LR 32.

SENATOR BEUTLER: LR 32 is adopted. Next item, Mr. Clerk.
