

SENATOR PIRSCH: Senator Hall, I can't find in statute anything on the local jails on how good time can be pulled back. Do you have a reference to that?

SENATOR HALL: Senator...thank you, Madam President and members. Senator Pirsch, I don't at my disposal, but I will get it for you. I believe that there is a provision that allows the correctional facilities to have discretion, depending on the type of offense that occurs, over the individual's...the individual prisoner's or inmate's actions. And I believe that it's kind of an omnibus type of provision, but I'll look for that and get it to you.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Okay. I also want to remind you that in bill 113 Senator Lindsay also, I added, in Section 3, that the credit against a jail term shall be given to any person sentenced to a city or county jail for time spent in jail as a result of the criminal charge for which the jail term is imposed, or as a result of conduct upon which such charge is based. Such credit shall include but not be limited to, now remember, these are other days that are coming off of their original sentence, prior to trial, during trial, pending sentence,...

PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR PIRSCH: ...pending resolution of an appeal and prior to delivery of such person to the county board of corrections. And also credit to any person sentenced to a city or county jail who is eligible for credit shall be set forth as part of the sentence at the time such sentence is imposed. So when that sentence is imposed they are already getting credit for all of those days, too. So, that is on top of after they actually enter the correctional facility. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator. The Chair recognizes Senator Robinson.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Madam President, members of the body, Senator Lindsay, I have some questions I'd like to...

SENATOR ROBINSON: Will you define...will you define good time for me.
