

Mahoney and they have authorization right now for 5,000, they're asking for 10,000. The Platte River State Park is the next closest one. It has authorization for 4,000 and...or they are running at about 4,000 and they don't think that's going to increase in the near future. And Fort Rob is the third one, has about a 2,500 dollar change cash fund. So there isn't any fiscal note attached to this bill. There would be a minimal savings in gas, I guess, for the people at Mahoney because they wouldn't have to be running back and forth all the time. It will not change the amount of the overall change cash fund for the state parks, it will just give more to Mahoney at this point. So, with that, I think I've answered any questions but if you have any, I would be happy to either try to answer them or find out the answers for it. Thank you very much.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Mr. Chairman, members, if Senator Schimek could answer a few questions for me, please.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Where were the Fremont State Lakes on that list?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I haven't the vaguest idea. (Laughter.)

SENATOR JANSSEN: That's probably because that's where the poor people go to the state recreation area. The rich people go to Mahoney and Platte River State Park. They also...I'm just kidding there, but the cash fund problem at Fremont State Lakes is also a problem and I would be very much in favor of this legislation because it does run into a problem running back and forth to the bank and there are several areas in the Fremont State Lakes where they have cash registers also, and being in business, I know what it's like to run out of change. It's not a very good...very good atmosphere to be in. So I am in support of your bill, Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And may I respond just a minute...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.
