SPEAKER WITHEM: Thank you, Senator Preister. We are under call. We're still looking for six members. Senators Abboud, Lynch... Senator Lynch is here, I believe; Senator Pirsch, Senator Schellpeper, Senator Wesely, Senator Witek. And we have had a request to have a roll call in reverse order on this measure. Senator Witek, Senator Schellpeper and Senator Pirsch. We're now waiting for Senator Witek and Senator Pirsch. Senator Preister, the Clerk informs me that, at this point, we are unable to locate the two missing senators.

SENATOR PREISTER: We can proceed.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Proceed.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken. See page 491 of the Legislative Journal.) 6 ayes, 31 nays, Mr. President, on the amendment.

SPEAKER WITHEM: The amendment is defeated. Anything further on the bill?

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Chambers would move to amend. (FA4 appears on page 491 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Chambers. The call is raised.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, this is what I refer to as a peewee amendment. On page 2... Senator Elmer, do you have a copy of your bill before you?

SENATOR ELMER: Senator Chambers, I certainly do.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: On page 2, in line 18, after the word "may" I would insert "lawfully", so that you're talking about these lands and waters where these activities may lawfully occur. To simply say they may occur means that anybody may do this. They may do it in the center of the highway or anyplace else, but this would make it clear that you're talking about activity occurring where it may lawfully occur. That's the amendment that I'm offering.
