SENATOR SCHMITT: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR SCHMITT: Well, probably not, no.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. And I want it clear that my remarks are not aimed at Senator Schmitt. Senator Schmitt and I get along very well with each other. I'm serious about my motion and I hope you all will think about it. If we kill this bill, we have not harmed anything. If we enact it, then it is one of those ridiculous things that can be used to ridicule the Legislature not only here, but in other states. It might even make one of those little fillers in somebody's newspaper where, get this, our Legislature in action, five-year-old lifetime hunter. I hope that you will vote in favor of this motion.
