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the body were a lawyer or trained in law. I probably would have to disagree with that in thinking that we would be here year round every day and certainly I doubt our salary would be \$12,000. Thank you.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Senator Bohlke. You've heard the close on the Bohlke amendment. The question is the adoption. All those in favor of the amendment vote aye, opposed nay.

SPEAKER WITHEM PRESIDING

SPEAKER WITHEM: Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 35 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of Senator Bohlke's amendment.

SPEAKER WITHEM: The Bohlke amendment is adopted. I'd like to recognize a guest of the Legislature. Our theory is that he forgot he's no longer a member, just drove down here automatically this morning. We have with us former Senator Brad Ashford, a guest of Senator Brown, under the balcony. Good to see you, Brad. Anything else on the bill?

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Bromm would move to amend. (Bromm amendment appears on page 546 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Bromm.

SENATOR BROMM: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and this is the last amendment that I have anything to do with at this point anyway. I've had it distributed and what it does is it adds a Section (6), subsection (6) to Section 1 where the definitions of the bill are. And what I have attempted to do is to insert a definition in what it means to actively recruit and Senator Chambers and I had a little discussion on the floor yesterday and I asked him what it meant to actively recruit. In fact, I think I asked him whether putting an ad in the paper down in Texas would be actively recruiting and he indicated that in his intention it was and this broad scope of what actively recruiting could be gives me some concern. So what I've said is that actively recruit shall mean soliciting prospective employees, directly or through an agent, by personal contact, or by providing transportation from the site of recruitment to this state. So if the employer or if the employer hires somebody or
