SENATOR LINDSAY: Madam President, I believe there is an amendment to the amendment coming up to the desk. I would wait and speak to the amendment.

CLERK: Madam President, Senators Lindsay and Janssen would move to the amendment by inserting the word "permanently" before the word "affixed".

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Lindsay, do you wish to speak to the amendment to the amendment?

SENATOR LINDSAY: Thank you, Madam President. This is the issue that Senator Janssen just raised. I think he is absolutely correct. All it would do is make it say that the name shall be permanently affixed and I think Senator Jones also spoke to that. With that, I'd urge adoption of the amendment.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Maybe a question of Senator Janssen and Senator Lindsay, or maybe Senator Jones, could I use my, I think out in the western part of the state is we have different brands on the cattle, could you use that as your stamp rather than your name? Senator Jones.
