That is existing law, has been in law for many, many years. In committee Senator Pedersen asked a good question about could someone who is a correctional official give that notice and say, don't loiter, we want you to leave. We weren't sure whether that was included in the definition of peace officer and so at this point in time I'm including the words "or correctional officer", I passed out the amendment, to be right after "police officer" in order to give
