

more than willing to do that. But I don't see those amendments flying up to make this bill a better bill, because...

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR HALL: ...the people are opposed to it, and they're opposed to it for one reason or another. But I can guarantee you they're not opposed to it because it's something the vast majority of their constituents don't want. This is a classic case where our constituents don't know about a piece of legislation until after the fact, in many cases. And I firmly believe that if we would all go out and do one of those polls and ask, do you think, once you get off the job, you ought to be able to use lawful products? I think with a resounding yes you would get back those surveys, that poll would come in and it would say, absolutely, I don't want the employer to come home with me. And that's all 216 does, it protects the rights of the employers, but it balances the scales so that the employees are not forgotten, and that's all it does. With that, Madam President, I would urge advancement to E & R Initial of LB 216.

SENATOR CROSBY: Time. Thank you, Senator Hall. Before we continue with the debate, I've been asked to announce that Doctor Clarence Davis, Junior, of Osceola, is the doctor of the day today. He's in his office, he's not in the Chamber right now, but he is here. He's from Senator Bromm's district, and we just wanted you to know that in case anybody wants to know if there is a doctor in the house. Mr. Clerk, do you have a motion?
