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young people from ever taking up the habit. But I don't feel quite so strongly about adults who are already smokers. So with that I'd like to hear the debate.

**SPEAKER WITHEM:** Thank you, Senator Schimek. On the Schimek amendment, Senator Hall.

**SENATOR HALL:** Thank you, Mr. President, members. I rise to oppose Senator Schimek's amendment and Senator Preister's bill. The proposal in the amendment says that we are going to find a ventilated room, separately ventilated room that is going to be a smoking area in the State Capitol. It can't be a rest room or the cafeteria, and does it have to meet ADA requirements or can we just pick a room up in the tower. I mean what are we talking about here, and I'm not...I'm being a tad bit facetious but I'm rising to all 210 pounds of my normal girth and I'm not throwing off any more shadow than I normally do, but I will tell you, I'd like to kill a few trees, make some clubs, and kill this bill with them, but I don't know that that's going to happen. The proposal, as I read it, has some real concerns, and I think they need to be addressed constructively, but I am also...Senator Preister talked about being concerned about the children in the Capitol and the artwork here, but yet we exempt the dormitories of the University of Nebraska, and we exempt the cabins and buildings under Game and Parks, and I think those are full of kids from time to time. We're going to let them out and, of course, Game and Parks would come in and support this because their are exempted out of it. I would too. They are going to have smoking cabins and nonsmoking cabins, which is...and smoking rooms, and nonsmoking rooms which has become the norm in the motels and the hotel industry, and that's what they are involved in in these areas. But at the colleges, we are going to exempt the buildings. You are going to be 10 feet away. We are going to be...exempt the dormitories and residential halls or we are going to I guess allow them to have their own policy. But as I read this, I guess I have a question if somebody can answer down the road, what happens at Memorial Stadium? We have got a great policy over there. We have got an open-air stadium you can't smoke in, but you can go downstairs underneath and smoke right now. Now does that go away under this bill. As I read it, it would. You wouldn't have the ability, it's own property or buildings or any portion of there, and the exemption for the university only applies to private residences, residential halls, and dormitories under the control of the Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska, and Board of
