SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Wickersham.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: I'd call the question.

SPEAKER WITHEM: The question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. The question is, shall debate cease? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 2 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Debate has ceased. Senator Wehrbein, you are recognized to close.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes, Mr. Chairman, I'd like to give one minute of my time or whatever she needs to Senator Crosby and then I'll take another minute.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Crosby.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein, very much. I just want to clear the record about the commissioners who are appointed by the Governor and so on, the Educational Television Commissioners. Herb Schimek is chairman of that commission. Those people are not paid. That is not a paid position and I don't think that's fair to have in the record. Sounds as if he's representing an SEA and is paid for that job. Jack McBride is the Executive Director of the Educational Television's system and if any of you read the World-Herald story yesterday, it tells his story how he started down here in a storefront and in a basement of Temple in a very low key way to build up what we have today so, thank you, Senator Wehrbein, thank you.
