SENATOR BEUTLER: Mr. Speaker, I'd reluctantly ask for a call of the house, roll call vote.

SPEAKER WITHEM: The question is, shall the house go under call? All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. Record.

CLERK: 17 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, to go under call.

SPEAKER WITHEM: The house is under call. Members, please return to the Chamber, record your presence. Unauthorized parties leave the floor. The house is under call. Senator Pirsch, could you check in, please. Senator Jensen. Senator Hillman, could you check in, please. Senator Cudaback, Senator Schellpeper, Senator Schimek, Senator Warner. Senators Cudaback, Schellpeper, Warner. Senator Cudaback and Senator Warner. Senator Beutler, we've been told that Senator Warner is probably out of the building and that Senator Cudaback is on his way. Senator Beutler has authorized us to proceed. Mr. Clerk.
