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elsewhere. You have plenty of other places we have designated smoking areas. You have an option. When you're in a vehicle there is no option, you're in one room, one space and sharing that one space. There is no other place so I can see where it would be very easy to implement this restriction in a vehicle and very difficult and possibly very expensive to implement this anywhere else. I think if, for those people who intend to try to pursue some type of a smoking ban in buildings or we discussed yesterday some of these rooms that would have ventilation, etcetera, that maybe a little more research needs to be done and definitely a fiscal...a little bit of fiscal research on what the possible impact for costs are on implementing something like this, but I don't think it would be...I don't think they would incur any expense to go ahead and say that we can't...that individuals can't smoke in a vehicle. So it makes much more sense to me, at this time, to go ahead and vote for the Bohlke amendment and then vote the bill forward so that something can be done at this time, and then maybe look into it a little more on the cost, definitely on the cost and the necessity of the ban in buildings. So I will be voting for the Bohlke amendment. Without it, I will not be voting for this piece of legislation. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Witek. Senator Robinson.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Madam President and members of the body, Senator Preister and someone else mentioned it too that we're sort of dragging our feet. We shouldn't be dragging our feet, we should be leaders in this issue and we certainly haven't been. And it's like Senator Preister and Senator Wesely says, it does gut the bill. I think it's time that we, as a Legislature, show some...that we show some leadership in this area and show the people of Nebraska we're concerned about the health of the people of Nebraska and the health costs that keep rising year after year. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator. Senator Preister.

SENATOR PREISTER: Thank you, Honorable President, friends all. We are not the leader in this. We are not taking such a large step. I have some of the testimony from Tom Bassett who is working with the Coalition for Tobacco-Free Lincoln, and he said that he did some investigating and did a survey and this was a couple years ago. At that time, 69 percent of the large businesses in Omaha, and it says 69...the survey done a couple
