SENATOR HALL: We started the call at ten fifty-four. I am not going to close to any great extent or go beyond the five minutes that would be allowed. The bill...and there was no debate because we have debated it twice before on General File, and I think folks are where they are going to be in terms of the vote on the issue. I would only say that the proposal protects individuals outside the workplace for use of lawful products. I think it's a modest proposal, it is narrow in scope as opposed to some of the other measures that have come in, in the past, on this issue. I would urge advancement to E & R Initial of this proposal and would hope that you would support it. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Hall. Did you request a roll call vote?

SENATOR HALL: No.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: No. Question before the body is the advancement of LB 216. All those in favor vote aye, all those opposed vote nay. Have you all voted? There's been a request for a roll call vote. Mr. Clerk.

ASSISTANT CLERK: (Roll call vote taken. See page 745 of the Legislative Journal.) The vote is 20 ayes, 17 nays on the advancement of the bill.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: LB 216 fails to advance. I raise the call. We turn now to LB 366.

ASSISTANT CLERK: LB 366 was introduced by Senators Bromm, Dierks, Janssen and Jones. (Read title.) The bill was read for the first time on January 11th, referred to the Health and Human Services Committee. They report the bill to General File with committee amendments.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The Chair recognizes Senator Wesely to open on the committee amendments.

SENATOR WESELY: Madam President, members of the Legislature, the committee did consider LB 366, it deals with county hospitals and makes a number of changes in their law. One particular change allows a county hospital to establish a county
