The amendment can always be modified. When it's not adopted, the argument is made that this bill is greased and there's no substantial opposition to the bill or anything in it.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's the spin being put on it. So some of these amendments that have substance, such as Senator Coordsen's, ought to be adopted. And I don't think he's an unreasonable person. If a better way of notification could be provided which truly provided notification, I think a discussion could be had with him and changes could occur. But, until something better comes along, I'm sure we would all like to have a "yachet", you all say yacht, we would all like to have a "yachet" but we can't always have one, so I'm sure Senator Cap Dierks and I, if we were drowning, we would take a row boat, if that's all that came along, until the "yachet" followed. I support Senator Coordsen's amendment.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Madam President, and members of the body...
