

and I think you should give that some thought. If you adopt my amendment, it is a way to solve that problem and not have to go home and tell people that you voted to raise their property taxes to help pay for the Micron project.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Wickersham. The question before the body is the adoption of the Wickersham amendment to LB 830. All those in favor vote aye. All those opposed vote nay. Have you all voted? Please record.

CLERK: (Read record vote. See pages 821-13 of the Legislative Journal.) 12 ayes, 17 nays on the amendment, Madam President.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The Wickersham amendment fails.

CLERK: Madam President, Senator Will would move to amend the bill.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The Chair recognizes Senator Will.

SENATOR WILL: Thank you, Madam President. In the interest of time, I would withdraw that amendment.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: It is withdrawn.

CLERK: Senator Hall would move to amend, Madam President. (Hall amendment appears on page 813 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The Chair recognizes Senator Hall.

CLERK: This is the one, Senator, on page 3, strike section (10), on page 3, I assume subsection (10).

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Madam President and members. The amendment was passed out this morning and I apologize, it's probably long gone in terms of the amount of paper that you have on your desk, but it deals with Section 2 of the bill which is the intent language and there are a number of amendments that deal with various sections throughout the Section 2. The first is section (10), and I would ask you to just take the time to read the section. I know that there have been a number of amendments that deal with, one could argue, more substantive issues but I believe that intent language that we place in bills from time to time we overlook. We place it in the statute, we pass it as a part of a proposal and we forget about it.
