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that we added that provides a recapture provision in the event that a company that qualified did not live up to the applications, that there is a provision which the state could recapture any of the benefits that would have been paid and, in fact, once it is determined they have not met the requirements why the recapture provisions are due immediately and constitute the fact of a lien against the assets of the company. Also one of the amendments would allow any refunds to the company of any withholding paid in error or allow that the refunds could be paid. And then there is another one which I believe there will be an amendment on that deals with the impact on 1059, the state aid bill, as the committee amendment provides that the 20 percent of income tax that is paid to the school district of the resident that the employee's home is in, obviously, under the act does not go to the school. Under the provisions as offered by the committee amendment, that 20 percent would still be credited to the school district for 1059 as an available asset or available receipt, but for calculations of need it would be counted as if it had received even though they had not. And then finally the sunset provision that was contained in another bill, if the act is not utilized why it will be sunset as of February 1, 1967 if no applications have been approved. That, briefly, is what the committee amendments do.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator. Mr. Clerk, there is a motion.
