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assume, and declare all of the land in a county outside of the municipalities as being blighted and substandard as a general designation, and then at some point in time, if there was interest in obtaining any parcel within all of that land outside of a municipality, that they could simply point to an area that they wanted and through the other processes take it, and there really wouldn't be any good advance warning. I would have preferred, of course, my amendment yesterday which would have more narrowly defined the proposed blighted and substandard area by notice to the landowners, but this, quite frankly, is the best that I can do at the current time, and it does provide for a, hopefully, a narrowing of the definition or narrowing of the areas that might be asked to be designated as blighted, and then it does, in fact, provide actual notice to all of the property owners of the most recent available record. Perhaps five days isn't long enough, but the calendar in approval of a project application is so tight that this is probably about all of the time that there is available after an application is received and before a determination is made. Thank you, Madam President.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Coordsen. Further discussion on the Coordsen amendment? Seeing none, Senator Coordsen, would you like to close. Senator Coordsen waives closing. The question is the adoption of the Coordsen amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed. Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on the adoption of Senator Coordsen's amendment.

SENATOR CROSBY: The Coordsen amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Madam President, the next amendment I have is by Senator Chambers, who temporarily had to be excused, and instructed me to pass that over. The next amendment following that, Senator Wesely, AM0522, Senator.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Wesely.

CLERK: Section 4 and 5, act terminated on January 1, year, 2000, Senator.

SENATOR WESELY: Okay. I think I have a substitute, or is this the one?
