

statute. They will comply with the restrictions and the limitations of that act, but what you are really after is stopping people from applying into the future without further legislative action.

SENATOR WESELY: You make an excellent point, and I know exactly what you are saying, and I agreed with you last night, and I agree again, and, absolutely, the intent is that it is the application process that shuts off, nothing else. I think, I am trying again, the intent is that the provisions of the law continue, the application process terminates, and I don't know if we can clarify it further on the language. I apologize, and it has only been 24 hours since we last talked about this and we haven't had time to be real clear about it. But I'm willing to look at further language on this, Senator Kristensen.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Well, I don't necessarily have to have right now that language, other than I want to make sure that as we discuss...

SENATOR WESELY: Oh.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: ...that and take this vote...

SENATOR WESELY: It (inaudible) clear.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: ...that you are really after shutting off applications.

SENATOR WESELY: Yeah, yeah, that's all.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: And I'm not sure I know what else to do with this, but there is an inconsistency there that I've either got to explain or get rid of.

SENATOR WESELY: Okay. Let me just state for the record, the absolute intent is not to discontinue any projects or applications that are made prior to the date. They would go forward under the law that we pass with LB 830, but the applications that would come after that date would not be allowed. So all it would do...all this amendment does is cut off further applications, again unless the Legislature extends the date or eliminates the sunset sometime in the next four sessions. So what you said, what you stated, what you interpreted...
