be able to do. If there are problems, we'll come in and address them next session. Maybe we'll address them even later on this session. That's sort of thing happens. I'm proud of the work that the body has done, I'm proud of you sticking here with us this long. I think now is the time to vote to suspend the rules and to vote on the advancement of this bill. I would urge you to support the motion.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Withem. For discussion on suspension of the rules, Senator Hall, followed by Senators Wickersham, Chambers and Bernard-Stevens.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Madam President, I rise in opposition to the motion to suspend the rules and I would respectfully disagree with the good Speaker. The issue is one that, he's right, this is the motion that we used to use. We invoked a cloture rule or placed a cloture rule into our rules so that you would put a time limit on it. These proposals don't even want to, I guess, work through the eight hour limitation that is in the cloture rule. I would respectfully argue that there are a number of things in this bill that need to be cleaned up. I would argue and it's the first time I've heard Senator Withem allude to it, but it appears now what the intent is to pass anything across the board no matter what shape it is in for purposes of the board meeting that is going to be heard early next week at Micron and then clean it up later on in the session. That's what was said in so many words and, in fact, as many portions of the bill that we have not yet discussed or talked about, none of the amendments, I don't think to date, have been frivolous. Folks may not like listening to them. They may not like discussing them, they may just want to put their head down and say, well, we've decided to vote for this, we don't care what it says. Open up your AM7047 and go first to the very last page, page 41, lines 12 and 13. It's after the emergency clause and it says, on page 1, line 2 after the first semicolon insert "to provide an operative date, semicolon, to provide a termination date, semicolon," period. There's no reference to, I mean it doesn't fit. I have no idea where that goes, how it is incorporated and I've got an amendment up to strike it. Maybe that... I think it's little more than an E & R amendment, but it's something that needs to be addressed. Beyond that, flip to page 37 and 38 of the bill. Section 26 says, and there's another amendment to deal with this, in addition to any other provisions governing any public body or taxing body set forth in the Nebraska Redevelopment Act, for the
