If it doesn't, because right now there aren't those ideas up there that I consider to be improvements to the bill, but if there are some more of those, then we can withdraw this motion tomorrow morning and proceed and consider those additional improvements to the bill. If not, then the motion will still be up there. Bright and early tomorrow morning we can discuss whether we ought to suspend the rules to some more time and ultimately then vote to suspend the rules tomorrow morning. It probably doesn't make a lot of difference but let's...if somebody were to put a motion up to adjourn right now I would probably support it with the understanding that this motion will be before us, that we will not...I don't need the coaching necessarily, I think I know what I want to do and I'm making the point that I would be willing to vote to adjourn at this point. If that's somehow alienating some people on the floor, they can make the point when they get an opportunity to speak. That's what I would like to do is give people one more time to come in with some good ideas, that's what I understand people were wanting.
