But again I emphasize the Contract with America, the changes in the Congress, risk assessment they're talking about, cost-benefit assessment, that is the way people are thinking government has to go. Let's start it. Let's keep it going that way with the language that the Revenue Committee put in with this bill, and not change it with the amendment by Senator Brashear.

Senator Janssen, Senator Jones, Senator Chambers, Senator Cudaback. We are accepting call-in votes and the question is, shall debate cease?

CLERK: Senator Hartnett voting yes. Senator Vrtiska voting yes. Senator Pedersen voting yes. Senator Schimek voting no. Senator Schmitt voting yes. Senator Janssen voting yes.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Please record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 1 nay, Madam President, to cease debate.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Debate ceases. I raise the call and Senator Lindsay to close.
