PRESIDENT ROBAK: Any further discussion of the Chambers amendment? Seeing none, Senator Chambers, to close.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President, I'm a little offended, my...when I gave my presentation nobody thought it was that funny, while Senator Withem couldn't even get to the punch line. And they were laughing uproariously, back there. But nevertheless, we have agreed on this, and Senator Withem did give the explanation of what the language is for and I'll ask that you adopt it.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator. The question before the body is the adoption of the Chambers amendment to LB 829. All those in favor vote aye; all those opposed vote nay. Please record.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on the adoption of Senator Chambers' amendment.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The Chambers amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Senator Dierks would move to amend the bill. (Dierks amendment, FA67, appears on page 864 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Dierks.

SENATOR DIERKS: Madam President and members of the body, I'm going to try another time this evening to provide some sanity to this bill. It provides for...the amendment I had passed out if you'll look on page 10, line 15, after "project" there's a comma, you insert, "any costs to be incurred by the Department of Environmental Quality for the administration and issuance of any necessary licenses". This is part of the state costs that are going to be...that would be in Section 2 of that particular section. You know, we...we need to be aware of what these people use that could involve accidents in the environment. They have a very toxic element that's used out there and people
