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we're also establishing public policy that goes beyond the Micron project, and we don't always address that closely enough in the debate that's going on here. It will also provide good jobs for those people who will be building the plant and other things that will certainly help our economy. But we do need to look closely at the policy that we're establishing, the wording of the policy that we are establishing and how that's going to have an impact on other industries, other prospective employers that will be coming who may not be providing the quality level of job that Micron is said to be providing. I'm hearing from people in my district who are having their homestead exemption taken away because of some changes that we have made, and they're saying why are we giving away more to the corporations when we're doing it at the expense of the elderly. And I'm hearing from people who are on the waiting list for developmental disabilities who are in my district, and they're saying why are we not funding the waiting list for people to get services from developmental disabilities when we're giving away more to corporations who should be able to stand on their own and support...

PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR PREISTER: ...themselves in our climate of capitalism and economic development. What kind of subsidies are we doing here? I understand where they're coming from, and at the same time if we're talking about making some adjustments to welfare and to taking people out of that system then we do have to provide quality jobs, and we do have to provide some incentives. I can say that I rise with a very heavy heart in the whole process that we're going through of give-aways at a national level, and particularly as that impacts those people right here in Nebraska, and what we're giving away and at what cost, and to truly have a sense of how we're doing that. That's a part of what I'm struggling with, part of that is this eminent domain process that I have personally experienced through some of the people in my district who are still going and currently going through that process of eminent domain. I'm not sure at this point whether I'm going to support the amendment or not,...

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Time.
