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county, someone who is active in Democratic politics, and so on. I would be interested if any senator has taken time to go to the coffee shop and explain the options and ask people what they think, what they really do. And if, in fact, you get beyond the politicians, I think you are going to find that there is strong support in Nebraska for the way we are doing it now, and I'd like to end on one other comment, if I can. I'd like to end on one other comment, if I can, and I don't know if people are going to listen or not. Madam Chair, may I have a gavel.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: (Gavel.)

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: When Nebraska formed its Unicameral,...

PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: ...every state in the Union looked at that, and today states are looking at that, and I wonder what would happen if every state had a Unicameral. I think they probably would shake with fear. My gosh, we have a Unicameral, that would be terrible. And my point is when Nebraska made a change it was good for Nebraska, maybe not good for any other state. All the other states didn't fall in line and say, you know, we have got to have a Unicameral. The same thing is true with this. If Nebraska does something that is good for Nebraska, the rest of the states are not going to shake with excitement and fear and make a change, it's not going to happen. This deals just with Nebraskans. It has nothing to do with ag policy, Senator Wehrbein; has nothing to do with the exports and imports as referred to on General File. It has nothing to do with every other state does it, we are going to be in a terrible mess.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Time.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: It has to do with Nebraska, and I urge a vote no on the advancement of this bill.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Bernard-Stevens. Senator Schimek, followed by Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, Madam President, members of the body, I don't intend to speak very long on this bill. In fact, I probably would be better off not speaking at all and prolonging
