

CLERK: Senator Brown voting yes. Senator McKenzie voting yes.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 10 nays on adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER WITHEM: The amendment is adopted. Call is raised. Next item, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Senator Bohlke would move to amend, Mr. President. (Bohlke amendment appears on pages 981-82 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Bohlke, you are recognized.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Mr. President, members, I filed this amendment, currently it's up in bill drafters, actually for clarification, but I thought that there would probably be other amendments filed on this, but I've just...what it simply does, philosophically does, is say that it's 10 percent in the last presidential election rather than gubernatorial...or the percentage is of the last presidential election, not gubernatorial, and everywhere it says that, it would make that change. What I don't know is, as we've been discussing all these numbers, I'm not sure how that changes that base that Senator Schimek was figuring out and ratcheting up those numbers. Philosophically it's just something that I agree with, that it should be the presidential and not the gubernatorial. With that, that's the amendment and I'm sorry that I don't have the exact numbers and how that would ratchet it up but I'm sure it would probably increase the numbers. That's not my concern so much, it's just that philosophically I think that we have more people out, people watching, the numbers are larger but that it should be of the presidential rather than the gubernatorial.
