SPEAKER WITHEM: Thank you, Senator Engel. Now for discussion on the resolutions, Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members of the body. I feel compelled to rise and elaborate a little bit on Karl Timmermann. I remember Karl Timmermann. I'm probably the only one in the body here that ever met the man. I remember as being a very young boy at that time we all had war heroes, and Karl Timmermann was one of my heroes. And visiting with him, he would talk about his war deeds and so on, and as a boy about ten years old, that was very fascinating to me.
