SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Fisher.

SENATOR FISHER: Mr. President, I return to Senator Coordsen's comments about this. I would point out that we in committee discussed it and I think that's where we decided to include instead of just any political subdivision, include, make it countywide which gets the whole area, both the cities and the rural involved in it and I think gives it some form of a protection that would perhaps satisfy some of your concern. Thank you.

SENATOR MCKENZIE: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the body, Senator Fisher, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR FISHER: Yes, ma'am.

SENATOR MCKENZIE: It's my understanding that because of the nature of the facilities on the ammunition plant itself in terms of historic authenticity, that a good section of it had been listed with the federal government for archiving. Do you have any, I guess is the legislation in any way going to interfere with the completion of that project, are you aware?

SENATOR FISHER: As far as I know, it's not a concern to disturb that. I know there are some buildings out there. I also know that there is a problem with asbestos on it. The federal government would love to have it tumbled down, deteriorate. I think you'll see a strong effort from the Hall County Historical Society to work hard to preserve whatever significant is out there. Now with that in mind, that's about as far as I can go with that.
