

SENATOR MAURSTAD: Okay.

SENATOR ABOUD: The Morrow case,...

SENATOR CROSBY: Time. Senator Hartnett, discussion on 887.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Madam Chairman, members of the committee or the body, Senator Abboud, and I will give the rest of my time, I just got, to Senator Maurstad when I get done. I noticed that from Games and Parks, and there's another one, the Department of Health, uncollectible checks, what process do you know that these agencies use to collect the amount on those checks? They don't amount to, you know, that much, but do they follow normal practices as a business would in trying to collect the checks? Do you know, Senator Abboud?

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Abboud.

SENATOR ABOUD: No, I do not.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Okay. I would give the rest of my time to...

SENATOR ABOUD: Certainly. The case was filed against the State of Nebraska. The case did not go to court. It was settled out of court by the Attorney General's Office.

SENATOR MAURSTAD: Okay, so the Attorney General settled for that amount?

SENATOR ABOUD: Yes.

SENATOR MAURSTAD: Okay, thank you. And then I also had a question on...and I appreciate your patience, on the Game and Parks Commission, what are uncollectible permit vender accounts receivables? What...is that...they're purchasing goods from somebody and...or they're selling to somebody and they're not getting paid for what they're selling?
