

SENATOR JONES: Yes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: I share Senator Hall's perception, and I just have a very hard time thinking that it can be either...any other way, that the Attorney General is already required to review for the constitutionality with respect to the just compensation provisions of both the federal and State Constitution. Let me ask you, first of all, what is your purpose in setting out some additional language which I think has no effect, other than to say this is one part of what he's already required to do?

SENATOR JONES: I think that what I'm trying to do with this is just to make an awareness of the Attorney General, that he should be looking more precisely at these with the agencies, and also he's supposed to inform the Governor, too, in my bill.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, but he would be informing the Governor, or he should be under the current law, would you not agree, already informing the Governor if there's a problem with just compensation under the law?

SENATOR JONES: He should be, yes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Let me ask you this, with respect to current law and the way it's been working, can you cite for me one or two rules or regulations with respect to...that turned out to be violations of the just compensation provisions of either the state or federal government which were not caught under our current process.

SENATOR JONES: I can give you several examples. You want me to give you an example now, or do it on the bill, not on this amendment?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Well, you can go ahead now. Why don't you take my time, if you like.

SENATOR JONES: Yes, I can give you an example on the federal level. And I think we just need something in place in the state. But on the federal level I have a...

SENATOR BEUTLER: No, but on the state level, Senator, on the state level has there been an instance where something has gone askew here, or the Attorney General hasn't paid attention? I mean if the Attorney General is not doing his job, I guess I'd
