

bill or are we back to the McKenzie amendment, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator McKenzie would move to amend her amendment with AM1120, Senator. (McKenzie amendment appears on page 1225 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR HALL: Senator McKenzie, on your amendment to your amendment.

SENATOR MCKENZIE: Thank you, Mr. President and members, this is an amendment that adds one additional clarification that was not included before we dropped the amendment in for printing in the Journal. It has been distributed to you on your desk. It's on, "page 1, line 9 strikes "or delivered" after "Nebraska" and inserts "or delivered in Nebraska". Again, this is just clarification to make sure that we are able to tax corn which is delivered to any commercial channel in the State of Nebraska. It also then defines delivered or delivery and it means receiving corn or grain sorghum for any use other than storage. And this is really an issue that affects border companies and cooperatives where often they have corn delivered for storage across the state line for a period of time and then choose to take that corn back to use as feed. So we would be taxing corn at the actual point of sale and that sale relates to delivery but it's anything other than storage. I would answer any questions you might have on the amendment to the amendment.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Senator McKenzie. Senator Coordsen, your light is still next on the McKenzie amendment to the amendment. Senator Coordsen.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body, Senator McKenzie...
