

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right, and there is nothing in this resolution other than the statement in general that bylaws are to be adopted...

In other words, I don't think that the states could go off and, through this nonprofit corporation, enter into a joint purchasing agreement where they'd all buy paper together and sell it to each other cheaper. I think that would probably violate the spirit of doing that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And would the bylaws...Madam President, how much time do I have? Am I about out of time?

SENATOR CROSBY: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then I won't ask the question.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Withem, on the Chambers amendment.
