

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Well, if I could pursue that just a little more,...

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Sure.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...while we're conversing about it. It seems to me if what he said was true, that you could turn this into a delegation of the people and not of the legislature, that means you could turn a worm into a larvae or whatever. Now if you can't do that,...

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Yes, something like that, yeah.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay. Then if you can't do that, then you couldn't also take a few people off the street and take them back there and call them a delegation either

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Oh, absolutely not.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: So if you can't do it one way, I don't know how you can do it another way. That's really my point.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: That's right, and, of course, every state in the Union has submitted a call for a constitutional convention, every one of them throughout history. In fact, this state, I think we've done...Senator Landis is probably my best expert, but I think seven of them to my best count that this state has actually called for a constitutional convention on a particular issue or not over its history. And so has there always been discussions about this? Yes. This is not that process, it just can't happen.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay, thank you.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Senator Witek.
