SPEAKER WITHEM: I read it that way, but that's part of Senator Chambers' amendment. I don't know, I assume that's his intent, but I don't know that for a fact.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Chambers, let me ask you what...

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...your intent is with regard to this. I'm a little bit confused by the structure of it in terms of referencing The Conference of the States, Inc. when that entity doesn't even exist at this point in time, may be called by another name for all we know. But is it your intent that the delegates that we are sending back that will be chosen pursuant to this resolution, that their authority to take any action whatsoever would end...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Under my reso...under my form of the amendment, Senator Beutler, when that conference that they're talking about adjourned, 120 days after that everything, as far as Nebraska's participation with that corporation, is over.
