

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: My guess, Senator,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: In view of that, stay on your feet, if you don't mind. When we...

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Senator, I've been sitting the whole time here. It's just...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. When we get to the point, if that point is ever reached, where something is submitted to Congress, how will that document, which will contain that which is to be submitted, be put together? Will they have a group who will draft it, or will that simply be...what form will that take?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Well, Senator, I think that that action plan gets sent back for the states, and if they vote on that it becomes a petition or in effect the petition probably is the action plan. They'd vote on that. I assume that that's drafted by staff or by whoever, or maybe they're going to have a subcommittee of the actual delegates, I don't know that either.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Here's what I'm asking, would the action plan itself constitute what's submitted to Congress, or after it's sent to the states something can happen,...
