

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: That's right.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And it would be up to you to guard against that.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Thank you, Madam Chairman and members of the Legislature, this is not...I wanted to put this, it's a priority motion, it goes ahead of the kill motion because I think there are a lot of favorable things that the bill might be able to accomplish and I'm not necessarily opposed to that. I do have a lot of questions and I think Senator Chambers and Senator Wehrbein have brought up some questions that I really think we need to know some of the answers to before we move it to Select File. And I'm really uncomfortable about saying, well, let's get into the mode of having all these questions, let's go ahead and move the bill one time and we'll get them all answered at that point. I don't think that's a good policy for us to do at this point. Some of the questions I think that were asked that we need to have a better answer to is what is the repayment mechanism? I mean, Senator Engel's response, and I understand his response was, well, it's whatever we have out there already. Well what do we have out there already? Does it apply to this? And if they don't repay, what is the mechanism for collection and so on. That is one area of discussion I think we need to have some more information on. The two certainly is on the monies itself, how much, should we or should we not? I know we'll be discussing special education if not this afternoon, certainly early next week and we're going to be looking at how we limit funds, how we limit dollars. Is this something that we right now want to obligate \$6 million to? I
