

SENATOR BEUTLER: Yeah, I think that could just be standard language.

SENATOR HALL: But, okay, say I raise \$10,000 and all 10,000 of that, the donors have signed off saying I don't want it to be used to pay the income tax, how do I pay the income tax?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator, in that instance, it would be your responsibility to pay the income tax.

SENATOR HALL: But I'm not the campaign committee.

SENATOR BEUTLER: The...

SENATOR HALL: Earlier we said that the cam...I'm not the campaign committee, remember, for purposes of the loan I'm paying in terms of the income tax but then the bill actually says that I am personally liable. Correct, I mean, you're right. So, in other words, we are...we're making...we're saying that you can run for office, you can collect campaign contributions, those can all be designated as not being eligible to pay the income tax, so because I chose to raise monies and offered the donors the ability to make sure that those aren't subject to income tax, I would then be liable for the income tax personally.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator, you can choose not to accept those particular kinds of contributions also.

SENATOR HALL: And I could choose not to run too.

SENATOR BEUTLER: And as far...

SENATOR HALL: I mean, I could choose to lose.

SENATOR BEUTLER: And as far as this provision is concerned, if you don't like this provision, we can get rid of it. I don't think there is anything wrong with taxing all contributions. This was an effort to be...to provide some flexibility in dealing with perhaps some kinds of contributors for senators, but if you don't like that particular provision of the bill, I think it's fair and square to get rid of that particular provision.

SENATOR HALL: It's not my intent to get rid of it, my intent
